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Genasys Acoustics Orders Received from City of Sedona and Coconino County, AZ

The competitively bid orders were funded by Coconino County through a Federal Emergency Management Agency grant and additional funds approved by the Sedona City Council. The Acoustics installation sites are located in Uptown Sedona, the heart of the city's entertainment and tourist district. The city will have primary control over the systems, which can be operated individually or as a group, and Coconino County Emergency Management will maintain backup access through its countywide notification network.

Genasys CEO Richard Danforth said, "These orders represent continued validation of Genasys' expanding role as a trusted provider of critical communication solutions for emergency managers and law enforcement agencies. Each additional deployment strengthens our presence in key regions like Arizona, reinforces long-term customer relationships, and increases the likelihood of future follow-on orders and broader system adoption."

In Idaho, Latah County selected Genasys Protect to replace its previous emergency management provider.

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Genasys Protect Now Powers City of Worcester, MA Emergency Notification System

City Manager Eric D. Batista and Department of Emergency Communications and Management Commissioner Charles R. Goodwin recently announced the return of ALERTWorcester. "With the previous system, there were challenges and limitations in terms of what we could do and how we wanted to continue to provide better access and communication to residents."

The relaunch of ALERTWorcester also introduces a new feature: the ability for users to select lists for non-emergency notifications instead of seeing every single one, said Goodwin. "This enhancement is intended to reduce notification fatigue and frustration, which can sometimes lead users to unsubscribe entirely. By allowing individuals to choose the types of non-emergency updates they wish to receive, ALERTWorcester offers a more personalized and effective communication experience while helping the municipality maintain stronger long-term engagement with the public."

Examples of non-emergency notifications include election information, leaf collection and seasonal public works updates, parking bans, and winter weather notifications.

Another new addition to ALERTWorcester is the integration of the **Genasys Protect** app.

"Residents and businesses can now use the app or web platform to monitor alerts based on their home address, work address or current location," Goodwin said. "This added flexibility allows users to stay aware of conditions not only where they live but also where they work, travel or have family members."

'Eve of the worst wildfire season ever'

Eagle County Residents & Visitors Should Be Prepared to Evacuate

With Eagle County, Colorado at historic drought levels, Eagle Valley Wildland asked the community to prepare for a summer of fires

Eagle County's wildfire experts are bracing for the summer season after a winter of historic drought. "The term I'm using is ... the eve of the worst wildfire season ever," said Hugh Fairfield-Smith, division chief of wildland for the Eagle River Fire Protection District.

As of late March, the U.S. drought monitor put all of Eagle County in either extreme or exceptional drought, and the warm and dry weather is only expected to continue. The monitor cites "large fires develop" as one historical condition experienced in areas under extreme drought.

Everyone in Eagle County this summer should be prepared to evacuate in case of fire. Eagle County residents (and visitors) should sign up for **Genasys Protect**, the county's evacuation app with zones identified.

Gilpin County, CO Residents Urged to Prepare as Wildfire Risks Grow

At a recent community engagement meeting focused on wildfire preparedness, Gilpin County, Colorado officials warned that drought conditions are setting the stage for a dangerous fire season.

County Sheriff Kevin Armstrong said, "I'm very concerned about this upcoming season where we have fire season 365 days a year. I will order evacuations early. I'm not going to wait until it's at your back door."

A major focus of the meeting was the **Genasys Protect** system. The app allows residents to identify their evacuation zone and receive alerts tied to their location.

"If you don't know your zone, you're already behind," said OEM Director Steven Mingura.

Gilpin County has been divided into 19 zones.

Officials demonstrated how to use the app and encouraged residents to download it.

Mingura noted that Watch Duty is not an official source and urged residents to rely on County-issued information during emergencies.

April is Tsunami Awareness Month in Hawaii

Tsunami Awareness Month occurs every April in Hawaii to remember the devastating tsunami that struck the Aloha State on April 1, 1946, killing 158 people, injuring 163, and causing widespread destruction.

"As we saw with last year's tsunami, even events that are not catastrophic can still impact our shores," MEMA Administrator Amos Lonokailua-Hewett said. "That's why we encourage residents and visitors to understand evacuation zones, stay informed, and have an emergency plan."

"April is Tsunami Awareness Month in Hawaii, but there is no 'tsunami season' – tsunamis can occur at any time," he added.

In light of a recent fire, the City of Santee reminded residents that emergency preparedness is important year-round.

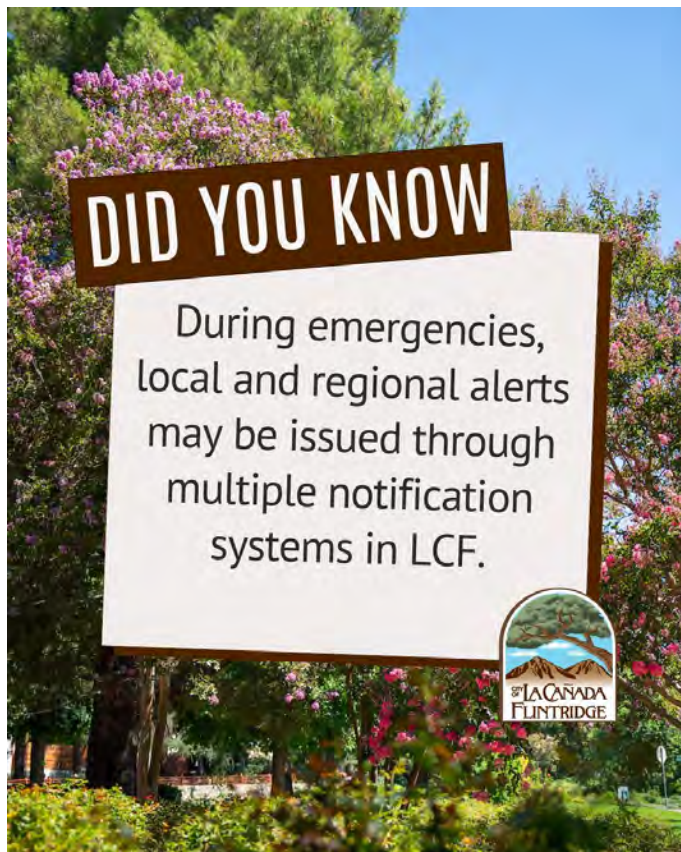

 **Genasys Protect** (primary alert): Used by incident command (joint agencies, including the city, responding to the incident) during major emergencies impacting the city, such as wildfires or large-scale evacuations. It issues zone-based evacuation orders and warnings. Evacuation status can be viewed on an interactive map; no registration is required.

 **Alert LA County**: Opt-in system for Los Angeles County's notification system for regional or multi-jurisdictional incidents.

 **AlertLCF**: During major incidents, AlertLCF is used to amplify and localize messages issued through Genasys Protect and may also be used to issue WEA alerts.
